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TOWN OF WESTFIELD AND WESTFIELD BOARD OF EDUCATION SIGN JOINT LETTER OF INTENT FOR PROPOSED EDISON SCHOOL MULTIPURPOSE FIELDS PROJECT

Shared service agreement will provide initial framework for state-of-the-art facility

WESTFIELD, NJ – JUNE 15, 2021 – The Town of Westfield and the Westfield Board of Education have signed a joint letter of intent (“LOI”) to explore a shared service agreement for a proposed multipurpose fields project at Edison Intermediate School. This LOI was authorized by the Westfield Town Council and the Westfield Board of Education at their respective meetings on June 15, 2021.

The proposed Edison School Multipurpose Fields Project consists of three turf, lighted multi-use fields behind the Edison Intermediate School property, which would be configured to provide the following:

Soccer

- Two regulation 108' x 360' fields
- One regulation 240' x 360' field
- Two regulation 135' x 195' youth fields

Lacrosse

- Three regulation 180' x 360' fields

Baseball

- One regulation 320' field, bleachers, dugouts, bullpens, batting cages and backstops
- One regulation 300' field, bleachers, dugouts, bullpens, batting cages and backstops

Field hockey

- Two regulation 180' x 300' fields with goals on wheels

Football/band/drill-team

- Two regulation 160' x 360' fields
- One new band tower

Providing new fields was one of the top recommendations that came out of the Town's Strategic Parks Plan -- a publicly-driven initiative which provided Westfield with a holistic, long-term road map for optimizing its parks, recreation opportunities, and open spaces and was adopted by the Town Council in January 2020.

While multiple projects were identified as opportunities in the Parks Plan, the Recreation Commission Parks & Fields Committee proposed the Edison School Multipurpose Fields Project as the top priority. It offers the greatest and most immediate additional capacity for the community and can be dedicated exclusively for Westfield teams and residents since it is not a Green Acres facility, unlike nearly all of the Town-owned municipal parks. By completing the Edison project first, the community gains immediate, expanded capacity that would benefit the largest number of potential user groups, while also offering the least disruption to existing fields during construction.

The Edison School property is owned by the Board of Education, and the Letter of Intent has provided the initial framework for the shared service agreement, which states the Town shall pay \$1 per year for 30 years to lease the property, and will bear responsibility for the financing, design, construction, and maintenance of the facility in cooperation with the Board of Education.

"This shared service agreement with the Board of Education represents an exciting and innovative opportunity to pursue long overdue state-of-the-art athletic and recreational facilities for our student athletes and Westfield community," said Mayor Shelley Brindle. "I am grateful to the Board of Education for their vision and partnership, and hope this agreement is just the beginning of a new era of collaboration where we work together to identify additional opportunities to improve services and facilities, and maximize the value we deliver to our taxpayers."

Currently, the Edison School fields are used almost exclusively by Edison School and Westfield High School for a variety of activities, including band, drill team, and practices for some Westfield High School sports teams. Only Westfield High School baseball games and select track and field event competitions can be held on the existing fields. The proposed project will accommodate and enhance the existing school utilization while adding significant new fields capacity (almost 400,000 square feet of turf, lit fields) for use by a wide range of user groups in Town, including girls and boys soccer, boys and girls lacrosse, field hockey, baseball, football, ultimate frisbee, and various other sports practices and potential civic uses.

Additionally, unlike nearly every Town-owned municipal park, Edison is not a Green Acres facility, which allows the fields to be reserved exclusively for Westfield teams and residents.

"The proposed fields project at Edison Intermediate School provides the Board of Education an innovative opportunity to work together with the Mayor and Town Council to provide additional, superior field space that will benefit our entire community," said Board President Amy Root. "We

look forward to partnering with the Mayor and Town Council as the plans are communicated to the community and as we move forward collaboratively to make this complex a reality.”

The Edison School Multipurpose Fields Project Steering Committee was formed in February 2020 to work with a consultant, Spiezle Architectural Group, which was hired through a public bidding process, to assist with the design of a potential project. The committee is comprised of the following individuals:

The total estimated cost of the proposed concept, if all three phases were to be done at the same time, is \$18.2MM. Once the project cost is finalized after donations and sponsorships are considered, if it is determined that spreading out the cost over time is more prudent, the Town could also consider a phased approach in which the estimated cost is \$9.2MM for Phase #1, \$5.9MM for Phase #2, and \$3.1MM for Phase #3, which could be completed over a few years. Due to the Town’s legal and financial flexibility with capital projects and bonding capacity, the financing of the entire project will be administered by the Town. It is anticipated that revenues from the recently adopted PILOT agreement from the Westfield Crossing redevelopment project will be used to service the annual debt. Additionally, a capital campaign seeking grants, sponsorships, and sports league contributions will commence once the final concept is approved after a public input process.

The Town and Board of Education will be conducting three public input sessions between mid-July and late September, with details to be provided in the next few weeks.
